

Is it possible to change a culture that condones the elimination of infants just because they are unwanted?

The month of August provides us a hint to the answer, for August was named by and for the first Roman Emperor, Augustus.

Augustus was the adopted son of the Roman leader, Julius Caesar, and was expected to succeed him as head of the Roman Republic. However, with the assignation of Julius, Augustus had to find a different path to be the leader of Rome. Through patience, military victories, astute political maneuvers, and with the help of his loyal allies he was able to eliminate the Roman Republic and create the Roman Empire, under his autocratic rule. He expanded the Roman Empire across the known world and unified it under a common system of laws, transportation, currency, architecture, calendar, and culture.

To finance his Empire, he instituted a system of taxation based on a census, the most famous being the one recorded in Luke 2: In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. (ESV) Christ also referred to Caesar in His answer to the question about paying taxes recorded in Matthew.

The Roman Empire was also notorious for its treatment of infants. It was legal for babies to be sold, killed, or abandoned for no other reason than they were unwanted. Parents had the legal right to dispose of their children for a number of reasons: economics of the family, birth defects, sickness, illegitimacy, or just being a female.

Sometimes mothers left their new born at a Columna Lactaria (Milk Column) which were government sanctioned sites where those who wished to have an infant would come and claim one.

It was also common for a parent to take their unwanted baby into the woods outside the city and leave the child to die of exposure or attacked by animal predators.

It was into this culture that the first Christians came with their respect for life, even small children. The Roman government responded to the Christian message with persecution. The goal of the government was to exterminate Christians by stripping their legal rights, destroying their churches, burning their sacred texts, and martyrdom.

The Christians responded to the persecutions with acts of compassion, including seeking out and rescuing unwanted, abandoned babies. Through personal sacrifice, prayers, and acts of kindness, the Christians were able to show the culture how it can cherish and not eliminate unwanted infants.

The Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty asks for your partnership in praying for those who reach out in acts of compassion and care for those children and their families. It is these people and organizations who can create a culture that values and protects life, especially the babies.
