

Just Because...

As any parent of a child who has learned the power of the word "Why?" knows, sometimes the answer that is most effective is, "Just because!"

A child is told to wear a jacket, the child asks, "Why?" The parent explains about temperature and that not wearing a jacket will cause a sickness. The child responds with, "Why?" The parent then cites studies and examples as to the benefit of wearing a jacket. The child smiles and says, "Why?" Eventually the parent resorts to, "Just because!" The parent then can add such explanations as, "I am the parent," or "Mom said so," or "Coach won't let you play on the team without a jacket," or "I love you so much."

The "Just because. . ." answer generally works with young children, for they understand that parents have the best interests of the family at the heart of every decision. Not so much with older ones, as they have been immersed in a popular culture that, for the most part, disdains absolute truth, discards old-fashioned values, relies on technology for information, values diversity, and desires to create an online public image.

A child that is told marriage is meant to be a lifelong union for one man and one woman asks, "Why?" The parent explains how men and women complement each other, the child responds with, "Why?" The parent launches into a scientific explanation, with some personal examples thrown in, and the child challenges, "Why?" Eventually the parent is frustrated and blurts out, "Just because. . ."

"Just because. . ." can be followed by: "that is God's plan and desire," or "that union is the only one that can create more humans," or "our society allows other forms for marriage and relationships, that doesn't mean traditional marriage is bad."

The world today is exponentially different than the world of just a generation past as technology has created instant communication with all of its strengths and weaknesses. Perhaps the greatest strength is also its greatest weakness – the speed of change.

In such a world, perhaps the best thing is knowing that there is another person, not like oneself, who has made the vow to be with you, "for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until death do us part."

Just maybe when your child asks why you and your spouse are married, you can smile and say, "Just because. . ." and follow-up with the comfort of the wedding vow.
