After age five, children thrive best when home and school speak the same language of values and virtue. Sadly, some schools—especially the most affordable—may lack that shared foundation, leaving children puzzled, insecure, or discouraged.

But there's a bright idea on the horizon: Parental Choice. It's a simple but powerful concept—education funds that follow the student, directed by the parents who know their children best. It's about giving families the freedom to choose schools that reflect their beliefs, nurture their children's gifts, and support their dreams.
