

So Help Me God

On April 30, 1789, George Washington stood on the balcony of the Federal Hall in New York City. At noon, he placed his right hand on a Bible and repeated the words of the oath of office taken from the United States Constitution read by New York Chancellor Robert Livingston:

"I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of the President of the United States and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States."

He then added the phrase, "So help me God."

Since then, those words have been repeated 46 more times by each succeeding president as he started his term in office.

These words are good words, powerful words, words that describe and proscribe the duties of the President.

In 1789 there was much discussion on the title and duties the new leader of the Executive Branch would assume. John Adams lobbied to have Washington titled, "His Most Benign Highness," while a congressional committee suggested the less royal one of "President of the United States."

The men who have been elected President of the United States have led the American Republic uninterrupted from its inception until today. They have been the Commander in Chief of twelve wars and many smaller conflicts. They have signed bills and enforced laws that brought equality, prosperity, and expansion to the United States. They have represented the Unites States at countless ceremonies, dinners, and functions. They have addressed the nation, the Congress, and the media to inform, instruct, and inspire the American people. They have been vilified, maligned, praised, and honored by individuals, political parties, and the press.

All this they have done after speaking the words, "So help me God."

It is now Donald Trump's turn to be President of the United States.

Let us resolve to offer prayers on his behalf, corporately and privately.
