

Family Traditions

Pumpkin spice, apple cider, caramel apples, sunny days, cool nights, colorful leaves, crisp mornings with frost on the pumpkins, Friday night football, Homecoming, apple picking, trips to the pumpkin patch, bonfires, canning, corn mazes, and festivals all make October a month for creating cherished family traditions.

The United States Senate unanimously passed Senate Resolution 160 on September 26, 2001, designating October as Family History Month. The resolution affirms: "It is the family, striving for a future of opportunity and hope, that reflects our Nation's belief in community, stability, and love," and "The family remains an institution of promise, reliance, and encouragement."

It is fitting that the family unit—and its history—be recognized and celebrated as a nation. Stories of ancestors who overcame adversity, struggled for financial security, fought for our nation's freedom, and laid a foundation for future generations inspire us to take our place in building strong families: rooted in the past, shaped by the present, and looking toward the future.

Though each family's story is unique, there are enduring patterns woven throughout history. Every family begins with the union of a man and a woman who seek to raise children and create a better world for them. Every family has stories of perseverance, sacrifice, and growth. Families gather around meals, observe traditions, celebrate milestones, and pass down faith practices from generation to generation.

Let us pause to discover our family's roots and stories. Let us take time to create new traditions for future generations. Let us build strong marriages between one man and one woman, so that the family may flourish through the gift of children. And let us especially pause to teach our children and grandchildren the faith found in the Scriptures and shared through the pulpit.

The family has been the one constant throughout history that shapes vibrant, faithful, and productive communities.

Today, however, the family is being devalued. Our culture increasingly views marriage as optional, promotes the notion that children do not need both a mother and a father, and glamorizes broken homes. Schools and parents often find themselves in conflict over a child's education. Meanwhile, the rise of relativism and secularism challenges the authority of Scripture in defining family roles, gender, and purpose.

The Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty advocates for moms and dads entrusted with the God-given gift of children—children who learn their family's history and faith through the witness of their loved ones, supported by, not replaced by, schools or government.
