

Two million United States military personal were sent to Europe starting in 1917 to protect the cause of freedom from German aggression. Army Pvt. Henry N. Gunther, of the 79th Infantry Division's 313th Infantry Regiment, was one such soldier serving in the American Expeditionary Forces.

On the morning of November 11, 1918, Private Gunther took his position outside the village of Chaumont-deviant-Damvillers, France. At 10:58 AM, Private Gunther was shot and killed as he charged a German roadblock. Of the over 116,000 American military fatalities, Private Gunther's death was the last official one, for just two minutes later at 11:00 AM, the Armistice with Germany silenced every hostile weapon of the war.

November 11th is celebrated as Veteran's Day, a day the country pauses to give thanks, honor, and respect to all who have ever served or who currently serve in a branch of United States military service.

Private Gunther took an oath of office when he joined the Army in which he promised to defend the Constitution of the United States from all enemies, foreign and domestic. He was willing to honor his oath with his life. Every member of all the United States military branches of service promises to defend the Constitution of the United States, even to the point of death.

One critical part of the Constitution that all veterans defend is the Religious Liberty of the First Amendment. The Founding Fathers created the First Amendment to safeguard fundamental individual liberties, especially Religious Liberty. The Founders wanted to make sure that free people would have an opportunity to have a place for faith development and expression that was free from government control.

The opportunity to practice one's faith is not just a right the military defends, but a right the military provides through the office of Chaplain.

The Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty partners with The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod's Ministry to the Armed Forces as it provides and supports Chaplains who minister to those in uniform. LCMS military chaplains serve as members of the military in every way but one – they are non-combatants. They eat, sleep, train, and exercise with their flock, both in garrison and in combat.

November 11, a day to honor our veterans, true Champions of Liberty!
